He was the bastard eldest son of earl Hákon Sigurðarson . He participated in the Battle of Hjörungavágr , the Battle of Svolder and the conquest of England. 918 - Death of King Eric of East Anglia. East Anglia brought under Wessex rule. Lady Aethelflaed of the Mercians begins to intrigue with diaffected factions within the Norse Kingdom of York and peacefully overruns the Borough of Leicester. 919 - Lady Aelfwynn of the Mercians is brought to the court of her maternal uncle, King Edward the Elder of England, and deprived of her authority in Mercia. King Edward formally annexes the country. The end
